





Ophélie Coueffé, Uni Passau:


There, enter the code 19 27 87 3 - and wait for the questions to start. Do not leave the Zoom, just open a new window and type menti.com.






We will then give the floor to each member of the students' team to tell us who they are, and explain to us why the slogan was chosen!

Ah, and for those who have not done it yet, we just recall that we have asked students to wear of have with them an object with the colour of their team. We will see this when we give them the floor once they come back.


So please, the students, go to the breakout rooms and chose a slogan for your team. Mentors and experts can stay here. We meet all of you back here in 10 minutes!





Block 2a

Axelle Cheney recalls the objectives of the Fit Europe project, highlighting the three pillars of the project: students in computer science ("future", "digital"), trained about "future" challenges, in a "multicultural" way, thanks to the fact they are mixed with professionals (companies' cultures) and from 4 countries.

She then goes through the agenda of the week and details each block.









Then Harald Kosch and Lionel Brunie introduce the topic. They both highlight that the question "Should big data rule tomorrow's world?" addresses:



• topics/issues (e.g. data privacy, diversity, fake news and the new political power from data leaders, etc.)

• processes: what impact do data have on our society's model? What new types of governance it allows (e.g. social media, etc.)? How far can technology go?



• both positive and negative changes: e.g. big data can help fighting climate change but at the same time, it raises concerns for the environment due to the data centers' cooling systems

Ophelie Coueffé then closes the session:

- Before we all break for our lunch, let me mention you two important things.
- First of all, the last session today is a fireside chat. What we want here is to give all of you the possibility to meet and network, and chat with other people participating in the seminar.
